

STATEMENT OF INTENT FOR LAST RITES

Funeral Planning Guide

The Church of the Holy Trinity, White Rock

**“Give rest, O Christ, to your servant with your saints,
where sorrow and pain are no more, neither sighing, but life everlasting.”**

“It is entirely fitting that Christian funerals reflect the various dimensions of the experience of death. Faith is not only belief: faith embraces even its own shadow, which is doubt. Liturgical expressions of faith and hope in the face of death should consequently leave room for the radical sense of anxiety and loss which the mourners experience. They should also enable, rather than deny, the grief process about which so much has been learned in recent years. On the other hand, Christian funerals should not become unrelieved expressions of anguish and despair: there is a time for thanksgiving even in the midst of mourning.

“This note of thanksgiving even in a time of tears explains, in part, the ancient association of Christian funerals with celebrations of the eucharist. Thanksgiving for the death and victory of the Christ vibrates with different and more basic tones at the time of the death of a fellow disciple. Further, the bread and wine of holy communion, that foretaste of the messianic banquet, convey an experience of the solidarity of the Christian community which is particularly appropriate to the moment. All our experience of the kingdom of God takes place between the poles of ‘already’ and ‘not yet,’ a tension which is only temporarily resolved for us when we remember with thanks the basic Christian story, and in the case of a funeral, the story of this particular Christian as well.” (*The Book of Alternative Services*, pg. 566)

The church should be notified immediately when a member is near death or has died. The clergy, in coordination with the family, will plan the funeral service. Services available include the following:

AT THE TIME OF DEATH

When a person is near death, the minister of the congregation should be notified and, when possible, the family and friends should come together with the minister to join in prayer. A litany and other suitable prayers are provided for Ministry at the Time of Death in The Book of Alternative Services. Please note, these prayers may be offered by family and friends in the absence of a clergy person.

BEFORE THE FUNERAL

After preparations have been completed, prayers may be offered at the home or at the funeral home. This brief service consists of suitable psalms, readings, and prayers. Alternatively, an abbreviated form of this service may be offered as the body is received in the church prior to the funeral liturgy. If desired, the body may remain in the nave of the church or the narthex where family member may receive visitors.

THE FUNERAL

The Funeral Liturgy is an Anglican worship service with suitable psalms, hymns, readings, and prayers for the departed. The worship service is customarily a Celebration of Holy Eucharist at which it is appropriate for Baptized Christians in the congregation to join the family in receiving Holy Communion. Members of the family of the deceased and close friends can take an active part in the service by reading the lessons, the psalms, leading the prayers, and by presenting the bread and wine at the offertory. The family and friends of the deceased may elect to omit the celebration Holy Communion.

THE COMMITTAL

A brief service of Committal usually follows the Resurrection Liturgy. This may be at the grave when interment follows, or in the memorial garden where the ashes find their final resting place. If cremation follows the funeral the Committal will take place at a time after the funeral liturgy.

SCRIPTURE READINGS

The funeral service usually includes one or more readings and psalms from Holy Scripture. When the service includes Holy Communion, a reading from the Gospels is required. A typical service will include an Old Testament reading, a Psalm, a New Testament reading, and a Gospel. Readings and Psalms suitable for the liturgies are listed below. One non-biblical reading is permissible in addition to the scripture reading(s), subject to the approval of the clergy.

Non-biblical Readings

- ___ A short, appropriate reading from a non-biblical source may be read instead of one of the readings before the Gospel, or at the time of the sermon, or another suitable point in the service.

It is desirable, whenever possible, for the family or friends of the deceased to participate in the service as lectors, who read the lessons and psalms or lead the prayers. If the service includes Holy Eucharist, family and friends may also present the bread and wine at the offertory.

MUSICAL SELECTIONS

Music is an integral part of the Christian faith and worship. Music should express the hope and faith that Christians manifest in the presence of death.

The funeral service will include only sacred music, any secular music desired must be reserved for use at the reception. Hymns should be strong and confident. Suitable hymns from Common Praise for a funeral liturgy include:

SERVICE BULLETINS

The congregation is encouraged to participate fully in the prayers, and in those portions of the service which traditionally belong to the laity. Such participation in the service gives an opportunity for people to surround those who mourn with their prayers and presence, and gives occasion to ease tension and allow for expression of feelings.

To that end, the parish will provide a service bulletin including all readings, prayers, and hymns. The bulletin may also include a photo of the deceased as well as a brief biography, if desired. As the primary focus of the worship space is the altar, additional photographs are appropriately displayed at the reception or in the narthex.

FLOWERS

Usually, the only flowers in the church are those at the altar. These may be given by the family or may be those used for worship on Sunday. If the family wishes to provide floral arrangements for the altar, it is understood that these are an offering to God in thanksgiving for the life of the deceased, and they are not to be removed after the service. Any additional arrangements received at the church will be placed in the narthex.

The church strongly discourages any lavish display of flowers and suggests funds instead be used to help the living. Flowers are symbols of the resurrection, and those on the altar are sufficient to remind the congregation of the joy of Christ’s resurrection.
