SUMMER SABBATH by The Rev. Joseph Dirbas

I am preparing to take some time away from church and spend a couple of weeks with my family. My vacation will begin on Wednesday, July 23. Summer seems an appropriate time for a break. After all, things are quieter. Or so they say.

I was just speaking with a clergy colleague today and we were discussing how we are both really busy right now. In these months when things quiet down in the church, you would think there would be time for



church leadership to rest. In actuality, the summer months are an incredibly fertile time of planning and preparing for the coming church year. It is a time when I, with the wardens and other members of the parish council, begin to think about implementing programs and ministries in the fall and beyond. Is it a lot of work? Yes! And it is full of joy and anticipation as we look to the possibilities ahead.

It would be easy to ignore taking a break. After all, it seems that no time is a good time to take time off. What's more, the work we are doing is enriching and life giving, so why not just keep doing it? The temptation is there, the urge to just keep working, keep dreaming, keep giving of yourself. But doing so will likely result in burnout in which we might crash and burn and, in the worst of circumstances, take the church with us. That is why honouring and respecting the sabbath is so important.

We must heed our call for sabbath, for rest and time away. Rest is necessary. Time away from the ministries, from the ideas, from the tasks that seem to never end is necessary. It is in these times of rest and quietness that we can begin to see more clearly where God is leading us next. So, we must find times when we can rest and be restored, rejuvenated for what lies ahead. Times when we can let our mind wander, read a good book, play with the kids, or simply watch a baseball game. In these moments, even while we are not at work for the church, the Spirit is at work in us. Reorienting our intentions to the will of God and those things which bring us health

and wholeness and life and joy.

I don't have any specific plans for my time away other than to simply rest. (As much as one can with five kids 13 and under) and having a chance to explore new things and new places with my family. I am thankful for the support of the wardens, Fr. Paul, and office staff who will fill in in my absence. I am thankful for the love and prayers of this amazing parish family. I am thankful that God has plans for us and is calling us into a new future. And I am eager to return, refreshed and renewed, to continue the work at hand and proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ.

PARISH COUNCIL RETREAT - THANK YOU FOR YOUR PRAYERS

Last Friday members of Parish Council gathered to reflect, dream, plan and create action items to consolidate our identity as Church of the Holy Trinity.

Jacqueline led us in morning prayer, and once refreshed spiritually we filled our mugs and spent time getting to know each other better as we shared stories of our own faith journeys.

As it was the feast of St. Benedict, our day was perfectly formed around the Benedictine practices of Prayer, Work, Study, Hospitality and Renewal.



We worked in groups to answer 4 key questions that generated discussion, and helped us hone our understanding of who we are and what are we called to be.

- Q1 What are we uniquely good at? What gives lots of energy? What makes us different? What builds connection.
- Q2 What are we less good at?
- Q3 What does the community outside need? What shows up at our door?
- Q4 What are you afraid of?

We prayed for courage and honesty to be able to answer the questions with an open heart and to listen discerningly to what was being said and what was left unsaid. We missed our colleagues who could not be with us, but their contributions and submissions were recorded in their absence. We are collating the responses and will create an opportunity in the fall to share our musings and our learning.

Fr. Joe led us spiritually and it was truly a remarkable day filled with joy laughter and the Holy Spirt, who has a wonderful sense of humour.

From Helen Brown:

...the way we ended the day with an action rather than a nebulous "oh we must do that" was for me the most positive outcome of the day. This gave us a motivation to make meaningful suggestions that will help us in moving forward with our ministries as a parish, both internally and to the wider community.

The people process is the river and the content are the leaves floating by. I appreciated the "getting to know one-another" and would like that once more fairly soon. Parish Council meetings are very scripted and formal and, apart from a Ministry Leader presenter, are business-centred. The openness, honesty and vulnerability from all created a safe place for the Holy Spirit to flow.

AROUND THE DIOCESE

RESHARING A NOTE FROM ARCHBISHOP STEPHENS

As the situation in the West Bank and Gaza continue to deteriorate, we thought to share this message from Archbishop Stephens originally sent in May 2025.



May 2025

To the People of the Diocese of New Westminster

The situation in Gaza continues to be deeply troubling and is very much on my mind. I write this letter to you to name my concerns and invite your prayers.

On May 12, the United Nations published a news release stating that about one in five people in Gaza, about 500,000 people, are facing imminent starvation. To be clear, this is not due to a lack of food but a blockade that does not allow the supplies that are waiting to reach those in greatest need. This is intentional starvation and another step in the genocide of the people of Gaza. This is outrageous. There needs to be an immediate cease-fire and a quick shift to allow food, water, shelter, health care and other necessary supplies to enter Gaza. This intentional blockade goes beyond the acts of war to premeditated acts designed to decimate innocent people caught with no safe place to hide. A change must come immediately.

UNICEF's Executive Director, Catherine Russell, recently said, "The risk of famine does not arrive suddenly. It unfolds in places where access to food is blocked, where health systems are decimated, and where children are left without the bare minimum to survive. Hunger and acute malnutrition are a daily reality for children across the Gaza Strip. We have repeatedly warned of this trajectory and call again on all parties to prevent a catastrophe."

In our Diocese, we join with our Acting-Primate, Archbishop Anne Germond, and many others who have been calling for a cease-fire for many months. We join with Anglican Archbishop Hosam Naoum, of the Diocese of Jerusalem, who said recently: "As Anglicans living in the

Lands of the Holy One, and amid the many challenges we face, we share in Pope Leo XIV's call for the Church to bear witness to God's love and to be a voice for justice and peace. We also stand in solidarity with all who suffer, seeking to empower and support them."

In this Season of Easter, the Season of the Resurrection, we pray that light will shine in the darkness, that new life will be seen and known, that love will conquer hate, that God's grace would be seen, known and lived. I invite you to join me in praying for the people of Gaza and for all in power and authority in this region. May the Holy Spirit's wisdom be known. I encourage you to write to political leaders to join in urging for a cease-fire and the free-flowing of aid into Gaza.

O God of peace, be with those who suffer in the Gaza Strip. Be their source of strength and hope. Bring justice and peace to a region torn by war and violence. May compassion and mercy be known. May Jesus' words of 'Love one Another' be transformative and life-changing. We pray your light to shine now and always. Amen



ALONGSIDE HOPE - SOLAR SUITCASE

The Resilience Fund met the goal of donations greater than \$250,000 which resulted in a \$250,000 match! This will go in supporting communities in need around the globe. Thank you to all who contributed to Alongside Hope in support of this campaign

Alongside Hope does amazing work throughout the world. One of their more creative projects is the

development of a Solar Suitcase to be used by midwives in developing countries where electricity is not always available. Many times, children are born with only the aid of cell phone flashlight or kerosene lamps.

The Solar Suitcase is a bright yellow, solar-powered kit filled with light and lifesaving tools. It includes LED lights, a fetal Doppler, headlamps, and phone charging ports, everything needed to safely deliver a baby in a clinic that is not connected to the power grid. The Solar Suitcase is the 2025 Wild Ride fundraising project.. You can learn more about this
