Epiphany by The Rev. Paul Richards

In the business, both inside the church and out, of Christmas, so often we forget the importance of Epiphany and the relevance to our lives today. More often than not, the Christmas story is compacted with both the gospel narratives of Luke and Matthew combined into one. The word Epiphany come from the Greek *epiphaneia*, meaning manifestation or appearance. As demonstrated in the beautiful painting above by long-time parishioner Catherine Robertson, we are most familiar with the image of the three Magi making their way




'Westward Leading, Still Proceeding' by Catherine Robertson

westward with their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh, for the Christ Child as they followed the great star by night. In some cultures, Epiphany is known as the Day of the Kings (Dia de los Reyes). It is also known as Twelfth Day or Twelfth Night, reflecting an old custom of giving a gift for each of the days from December 25 to January 6 for the 12 days of Christmas. Of course, many of us are familiar with this idea from the traditional carol "The Twelve Days of Christmas". Increasingly, the readings and text after Epiphany will dramatize the many ways in which people came to understand who Jesus was, and this revelation began with the Magi. The Magi are often referred to in older bible sources as wise men, and it has been suggested that these Gentiles were priestly descendants of eastern tribes who were known for their knowledge of the stars and ability to interpret dreams. The Magi are only mentioned in the Gospel of Matthew (2:1-2), and the number of wise men, while not stated in the gospel, was assumed in tradition because of the three gifts mentioned. In eastern Christianity and Syriac churches, tradition holds there were twelve Magi, and the linking of the Magi to kings later in Christianity is linked scripturally to Isaiah 60:1-6 and Psalm 72:11. Christian tradition has also held that three Magi individual identified with three Christian continents; Europe (Melchior), Asia (Caspar) and Africa (Balthasar). Equally, the three gifts mentioned in Matthew have traditionally been associated to kings (gold), priest (frankincense), and sacrifice (myrrh).

What do we take away from this important feast in the Christian calendar year? What can we learn from the journey of the Magi to pay homage to the Christ Child? First, I think we need to consider that the Magi travelled from the east because of their belief in the portents of the star and

the birth of a king. Many cultures were looking for the long-awaited signs of the Messiah King, perhaps most of all was a nervous Herod, as scripture tells us. When the Magi saw the star, they believed and set out on their journey. Like the Magi, may God give us all inspiration for this year's journey ahead of us to follow the one light in our lives. Secondly, the Magi headed into unknown territory, full of risk and association with Herod (who was well-known for his violence and paranoia). As Christians, we must go on our journey often to parts unknown, sometimes at personal risk. When we are singular in purpose for our Christian journey, we often must live outside our comfort zone. Third, the Magi remained committed to their journey, no matter where the star might lead them. Of course, we all know the end of their journey leads them to a tiny baby in rough conditions and from very ordinary parents. For our journey, may we look to heaven for guidance and take comfort in all the blessings that God sends us, in whatever form. Finally, the Magi brought gifts that befitted a king. What gift do we bring to God in the coming year? The gift of time, talent, service to your neighbour, your devotion and love? In our journeys, let us be like the Magi, both paying homage to God incarnate and bringing the gifts of ourselves to the Christ Child born to us.

FEAST OF THE EPIPHANY: JANUARY 6, 2023

All monies raised will directly support the CUSAP, a registered Canadian charity with the Canada Ukraine Foundation, which supports medical missions of surgeons and nurses from Canada to fly to the area and perform much-needed surgery on civilians wounded by the war. FLOWER AND AUMBRY CANDLE DEDICATIONS





All are welcome. And, if you'd like more information about joining the altar guild, please let Susan Lazar or Fr. Joe know.




IN THE NEIGHBOURHOOD (AND PARISH)
