THE TIME IN-BETWEEN by the Rev. Joseph Dirbas

When I read the scripture, I often try to imagine the experience of those we read about. I wonder what it was like walking with Jesus through Galilee, watching him cure the sick, seeing him raise the dead, hearing him preach the good news, and witnessing him embody, in a deeply and truly incarnational way, the love of God.



I imagine what it must have felt like for the disciples when they watched their

friend, their teacher, beaten by Roman soldiers and nailed to a cross. I wonder about the despair and doubt that went through their minds when they saw him die and his body laid in a tomb. And I wonder the exhilaration of the moment when they discovered he had risen from the dead. The moment of awakening when they suddenly understood what it was that Jesus was saying to them during his last few days as they journeyed toward Jerusalem.

There was hope and energy. Jesus has returned. He is here with us, more powerful than ever, resurrected, and glorified. And I can imagine their eagerness to see the kingdom restored, the power of the Messiah to overthrow the rulers of this world. The resurrected Jesus was with them for 40 days. As they communed with the risen Christ, we know from the scriptures they questioned when the promises of God would be granted. Jesus tells them, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." And then, just like that, he is gone again, ascended into heaven.

The author of Acts doesn't say much about the disciples' response, but I can't help but think they were probably once again disappointed and dumbfounded. Now what? He's gone again? Where do we go? What do we do? What did he mean when he said we will be witnesses to the whole world? How are we going to do that without him?

The disciples are in this in-between time. As they wait for clarity and understanding of their mission. They have been given a commission and aren't sure how to act upon it. They are

uncertain of their role, their power, their authority, their courage, and their ability to continue the mission that Jesus began, a mission instituted by God at the beginning of creation, the promise of bringing the created order to unity with God.

I'm sure we've all experienced similar feelings. I'm sure we all, as individuals and as a church community, have received a commission to be ambassadors of God's love and wondered how we are to accomplish that work. But we know what the disciples, at that moment, had yet to discover. We know the power of the Holy Spirit. We know the gift of God as comforter, advocate, wisdom, and companion who fills our hearts with joy and encourages us in our ministry to proclaim God's love to all people.

When we are in that in-between time of having a clear vision and directive of what we are to do and we wonder how we can do it, perhaps we can be like the apostles. They gathered in prayer in preparation for the coming of the Holy Spirit. We can gather in prayer with the knowledge that the Spirit is alive and active in each one of us. And, with that knowledge, we can begin the work we've been given.

In-between times are fruitful. They lead us to prayer. They invite us to trust in our God and saviour. And, as our world remains in an in-between time as we await God's kingdom, may we be steadfast in prayer. May we continue to proclaim the Good News. And, may we, with courage and hope, allow the power of the Holy Spirit to equip and enable us to be God's love in the world.




THE BISHOP IS COMING!

AN UPDATE FROM SYNOD

Fr. Joe, Robin Inglis, and Mary Ponsford represented the Church of the Holy Trinity as your delegates to the 2023 Synod of Diocese of New Westminster on May 12 and 13. It was two full days of church business, ministry reports, discernment about diocesan priorities, and discussion of the report and recommendations from the Task Force on Homelessness and Housing Affordability. Mary Ponsford shares the following notes and reflections:

Notes from the 122nd Synod on May 12 -13, 2023



Fr Joe, Robin Inglis and I spent 2 (glorious) days at Diocesan Synod in the Italian Cultural Centre in Vancouver, with about 250 other Anglicans. Our new Bishop John Stevens presided. His cheerful easygoing demeanour set the tone for a well paced and fairly interesting couple of days. There was a lot of housekeeping, many reports and appointments, praying and singing, but here are a few things I found especially interesting:

The most engaging speaker, I thought, told us about his work as the chaplain to VGH. Rev. Bryan Rivers seemed so passionate and fulfilled in his ministry. He had very touching stories about how his little calling card, a picture of the Good Shepherd with the 23rd psalm inside, which he gives to patients, produced results above "what we might ask or imagine". He gave each of us one to pass on to a sick friend.

A Main Event was the report by the **Task Force on Homelessness** in our diocese, a huge area stretching from Powell River to White Rock, and from Tsawwassen to Hope. A map included in the 40-page document showed detailed numbers of homeless in each

municipality. WR=16, Surrey= 644, Vancouver=2,095, Langley=209, are a few examples. I think there are more than 9,500 documented homeless people in our diocese. *A lot of attendees at Synod see it their Christian duty to do something to relieve some of this suffering.*

Another notable report, on a related topic, came from the **Diocesan Property Development Committee**. Because our diocese **is one of** *the largest holders of valuable land in the province*, we are in a position to do something about homelessness. **But it is easier said than done!**! Efforts to get involved in sheltered housing projects have been in the pipeline for 15 years. There are just so many obstacles to success! Some speakers told tales of their failed efforts in the past, and some of more recent disappointments. There certainly is the will, if we can find the way. I wonder if our present leadership will make it happen?

There were light and fun moments at Synod too: An **offertory collection** was taken up for the Downtown East Side. The bishop had wagered it would net \$8000, while the archdeacon expected just \$6500. A friendly rivalry ensued throughout the synod as to who would be right. The sale of 6 rather ordinary potted orchids was used to top up the collection. These plants were auctioned off *with style and pizazz* by the chancellor, George Cadman. I never saw such expensive flowers! They went for \$170 up to \$250 each, as rival bidders lost their minds (and showed off) paying ridiculous prices for \$30 plants, amidst lots of cheering and mirth. The bishop won!

My take-away hope is that we, as a diocese, find a way to use our valuable and underused real estate resources to house at least some of the needy. I really think we should. *Mary Ponsford*


